

WE HAVE MADE CHANGE!

The HCC was formed in 2003 as a task force when school district staff learned that Hernando students had some of the highest rates of alcohol and tobacco use in the State. Since incorporating in 2004 as a separate entity to focus on youth substance use and substance-related problems, HCC partners have made significant progress reducing and preventing youth substance use.



Rx and Other Opiates


